THE CORE OF CHARACTER

What does your protagonist <u>want</u>?

What they <u>want</u>—their <u>goal</u> or **objective**—is the core of who they are and what will fuel your story.

What does it look like?

How will your reader know that your protagonist has achieved their goal/attained the object of their desire? What does the reader see? This is the <u>external</u>"shape" of your story.

What does it mean?

Your protagonist's reasons for what they want will determine their decisions (think of our prompt, "flipping the switch"), which will determine their actions. This is the <u>internal</u> "compass" of your story.

<u>Protagonist</u> = <u>Main Character</u>

This is <u>who</u> your story is <u>about</u>; the character your reader follows from beginning to end.

External/Objective

Think: Object of Desire Their want or goal is an externally measurable object (even if it's something intangible, such as a relationship).

Internal/Subjective

The goal or object is <u>what they</u> want; we also must know <u>why t</u>hey want it.

Remember, different people can share the same goal but for very different reasons.

Either "what does it look like?" or "what does it mean?" will usually be answered automatically, once you've identified your protagonist's main goal. The other question might take some thought. Finally...

IF your protagonist were to achieve their goal, THEN would your story be over?

NO:

YES:

Keep exploring their object/goal.

You've found your character's core.

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
